500 Years

Prior to the invention and proliferation of Gutenberg's movable type printing press in 1440, Europe was dark with ignorance and ecclesiastical oppression. The people did not have Bibles and therefore were at the mercy of a powerful institutional international Church that was rife with corruption and abuse. The printing press, widely regarded as the most important invention of the second millennium, allowed for Bibles and sermons to be mass printed and widely distributed. The availability of these materials brought about a sharp increase in literacy, which broke the monopoly of the literate elite on education and learning in all areas, including religion.

Martin Luther was a German professor, priest, friar and theologian that put mass communication to good use. He strongly disputed many of the extra-biblical teachings promoted by the Church, such as indulgences, that freedom from God's punishment for sin, even future intentional sin, could be purchased with money. He nailed a copy of his Ninety-Five Theses on the door of the Church in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517. His refusal to renounce all of his writings at the demand of Pope Leo X resulted in his excommunication by the Pope and condemnation as an outlaw by the Emperor. He and his contemporary reformers, such as John Calvin and Huldrych Zwingli, promoted a return to Biblical doctrine of Sola Fide, that salvation is by grace alone, not by works, including works by the Church. We know that the Bible teaches that salvation and, consequently, eternal life are not earned by good deeds but are received only as the free gift of God's grace through the believer's faith in Jesus Christ as Redeemer from sin. Paramount in this movement was Sola Scriptura, the doctrine that the Bible, not the edicts of the Pope or tradition of the church, is the final authority for all matters of faith and practice.

Luther, Calvin and Zwingli were preceded by early reformers John Wycliffe and Jan Hus. Hus was burned at the stake for heresy against the doctrines of the Roman Catholic Church. These men translated or worked with translators so that the Bible could be read by all. Other reformers and translators came after them. Many

died in prison or were executed for the crime of putting the Bible into the hands and hearts of ordinary people. Wycliffe was an advocate for translation of the Bible into the vernacular. He completed a translation directly from the Latin Vulgate into Middle English in the year 1382. The spread of Wycliffe's Bible led to the death penalty for anyone found in unlicensed possession of Scripture in English. In full recognition of the danger, William Tyndale translated the first English Bible to draw directly from Hebrew and Greek texts and the first English translation to take advantage of the printing press. It was taken to be a direct challenge to the hegemony of both the Roman Catholic Church and the laws of England maintaining the church's position. In 1536, Tyndale was strangled and burned at the stake. In 1611, the 54 scholars who produced the King James Bible drew significantly from Tyndale's translation.

When you read your Bible and exercise your priesthood of the believer, remember the brave reformers who sacrificed all so that subsequent generations may know God and His Word.
