The Myth of Greener Grass by Tim Shull

Perhaps you have heard the expression, "the grass is greener on the other side of the fence." It is a proverb of a human tendency to enviously covet what we can't have or don't have. Years ago, I saw a cartoon depicting four cows at the corner of four fenced pastures, each one with his head through the wire, grazing in a pasture not his own. As a pastor, I have tried to bloom where God planted me and not be yearning for a bigger or better or greener place to serve. As a husband, I have kept my commitment to cherish my own wife and not desire another woman. As a parent, I have been careful to help our children be the best that they can be without comparing them with others. Greener grass is a myth, a lie from the devil.

Remember, you don't know what it's really like on the other side of the fence. The grass may appear to be greener, but that might be so because, as Irma Bombeck said, it is growing over a septic tank. You don't know the struggles and battles of that seemingly successful pastor or happy marriage or perfect parents. Also, and more importantly, we are commanded to Not Covet and instead to follow Paul's example to learn to be content and thankful whatever our circumstance. (Phil. 4:11). *"Godliness with contentment is great gain."* (see 1 Tim. 6:6-10). *"The attractions of this world, the delights of wealth, the search for success and lure of nice things come in and crowd out God."* Mark 4:19 (LB). It is better to be satisfied with what you have than to always be wanting something else. Ecclesiastes 6:9 (LB)

I've written and preached this message since early in my ministry, before there was an internet. But now, the temptation to obsessively compare ourselves, our spouses, our children, our homes, our cars, our vacations, and our churches to others is very strong. Theodore Roosevelt said, "Comparison is the thief of joy." Many allow their joy to be stolen by the myth of greener grass that they see online.

There is now a new clinical term in psychology called, "Facebook Depression" where "frustrated achievers" become aware of their "relative deprivation". In her book, "I'm Happy for You (sort of...not really)", Kay Wyma says that Obsessive Comparison Disorder is the new OCD. She describes "our compulsion to constantly compare ourselves with others, producing unwanted thoughts and feelings that drive us into depression, consumption, anxiety, and all-around discontent. OCD encourages us to stay up late on Pinterest or Facebook, pouring through

all 348 pictures of our friends' or frenemies' 'My Life Is Better than Yours' album. Then, it sends us to bed, wondering why we feel so anxious." We can fall prey to jealousy or low self-esteem because our family or our ministry or our church doesn't seem to be living as well as others appear to be. We forget that these postings are highlights. And trying to "keep up with the Jones" is never a good idea. We spend money we don't have to buy stuff we don't need to impress people we don't like. And we start to crave the affirmation that social media may provide. But what if, in response to our posting or pictures or sentence sermons or blogs, we don't get the Likes or Loves or Shares or Comments or Retweets that we hoped for? Do you take it personally?

Don't fall for it, friend. Use social media to praise God and thank Him for your family and your church. Use any method you can to draw people to your church, moreover to Jesus. Be Christ-like online and don't push people away with harsh political pronouncements. Don't compare your spouse or your kids or your marriage or your church to anybody else's. How do I find contentment in a culture of comparison? CRL-ALT-DEL. <u>Control</u> and resist the temptation to compare. Accept God's <u>Alternate</u> way, rejoice in and be thankful for what you have. <u>Delete</u> this world's way of thinking and be transformed by the renewing of your mind. His plan for you is good, acceptable and perfect.
