#### A Christian Heritage by Tim Shull

America was settled by people looking for religious freedom. Our spiritual forebearers came to these shores in order to worship God and practice their faith without fear of persecution.

When Columbus discovered this land, he took a cross in his hands and planted upon the newly discovered soil. He took possession of the Land for God.

When English settlers landed at Jamestown their first act was to kneel and dedicate themselves and this new continent to God who created it. The hearty souls who sailed on the Mayflower in 1620 fled from tyranny and oppression. In the Mayflower Compact they proclaimed they had come to the new world for "THE GLORY OF GOD AND THE ADVANCEMENT OF THE CHRISTIAN FAITH." The Mayflower Compact begins with the words, "In the name of God, Amen." Faith in God was the chart and compass that brought the Mayflower through the treacherous Atlantic. The first public building our forefathers erected was a church and their first public exercise was the worship and praise of God.

As the colonies prospered the people fell away from God. The descendants of the first settlers became more concerned with increasing their wealth and comfortable lifestyles than being faithful to God and His Word. The spiritual atmosphere deteriorated. Churches were dying, and many went off in strange spiritual directions.

Then something amazing happened: In the 1740's, Jonathan Edwards, George Whitefield, John Wesley, William Screven, Shubal Stearns, and others began to preach in brush arbors, in the churches, in the streets and in the fields. The Colonies were set afire spiritually as so many people came to Christ the era was known as THE GREAT AWAKENING. God used this in the birth of this nation. The environment was undeniably spiritual at the time of the American Revolution. This focus dramatically affected the men and women who founded this nation. Daniel Marshall was one of these. He entered what is now Edgefield County in 1762 and started churches that also started churches that still proclaim the gospel today.

On July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was signed, marking the birth of our nation. In declaring independence from an earthly power, our forefathers made a forthright declaration of dependence upon and commitment to Almighty God. They wrote about "the laws of nature and nature's God" as their authority. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed **by their Creator** with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. – That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed." The closing words of this great document declares: "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of **divine Providence**, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor."

After miraculous victory to win independence, as the Constitutional

convention reached a point of impasse in Philadelphia, at the suggestion of Benjamin Franklin, the convention stopped and knelt in fervent prayer for God's wisdom and guidance. That constitution was ratified only with the promise made to Baptists that there would soon follow a Bill of Rights, the first of which would insure that "congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

At the 1st Inaugural address, April 30, 1789, at Federal Hall in New York City, George Washington warned our nation, "The propitious smiles of Heaven can never be expected on a nation that disregards the eternal rules of order and right, which Heaven itself has ordained." After his oath and speech, President George Washington led the entire government up Wall St., turned right on Broadway, and walked to St. Paul's Chapel. There Washington led the new government – all Senators and Congressmen and Judges and his cabinet – in a prayer of consecration for the nation to Almighty God. (On 9-11-01, St. Paul's Chapel miraculously survived, though it was very close to ground zero. I believe God spared the site to be a reminder to our wayward nation of our original consecration.)

I could go on and on, listing the historical evidence that our nation was settled and founded by people yearning for religious freedom and seeking to establish a nation upon God and His word. Let us not shrink back from this heritage.
