## **Disaster Relief Team deployed to Kentucky**

The Edgefield Mud-Out Unit traveled to McDowell KY August 14-19 to assist homeowners with flood recovery. The team talked with homeowners to determine the best way they could help – in all they completed one mud-out, 4 basement debris cleanouts, 5 fogging treatments for mildew abatement, removed inside wall coverings and insulation and one roof repair. Debris was carried to the roadside for pickup and all this was accomplished in humid, damp, filthy conditions.

The second project was a small home that belonged to an elderly couple. The wife has Alzheimer's and the husband has restricted mobility. Their daughter, Amy was trying to clean the house with limited help from a brother and sister while maintaining her job and caring for her two children. After explaining the need to remove all damaged material for health and safety reasons the team went to work. Everything below 4 feet was removed—sinks, toilets, cabinets, appliances, etc. The house was sprayed and treated for mildew. This project took a day and half to complete.





The team members built a relationship with Amy and her parents. They had undergone dramatic changes in their lives and were overwhelmed with the effort necessary to recover physically. The goal of Disaster Relief is to take help, hope, and healing to those who have experienced a disaster. Through the example of these volunteers, spiritual discussions, sharing tracts and Bibles, Amy saw God at work. She prayed to receive Jesus as her Savior and made a profession of faith on August 18<sup>th</sup>.

### Dear Ole Dad by Tim Shull

My brothers and I were immeasurably blessed with wonderful Christian parents, Lonnie and Hazel Shull. They were married for 64 years, most of those in active ministry together. After a long illness, my father went home to his heavenly reward and rest on August 7. We held a family committal service at Southland Memorial Gardens, West Columbia, on August 11 and we were blessed to be joined by several hundred people at a public memorial service on August 22. Gloria and I are grateful for the many expressions of love that have been given to our family. I remember how thrilled my dad was when I began serving in Edgefield Association in 2014. He loved this association, so in the picture presentation shown at his memorial service, I was careful to include a picture from 2009 of Annabelle Nicholson and him.

During this time, many have gone out of their way to remind us of what a great man Lonnie Shull was. His obituary at ThompsonsFuneral.com lists some of his service. Many have shared with us how they remember him for his Biblical preaching, compassionate and conscientious pastoral ministry, sound and loyal denominational leadership, and his willingness to invest himself thoroughly in his community. Sometimes a great man or woman in the public eye is a poor keeper of his home. Not so with Lonnie & Hazel Shull. Their sons, daughters-in-love, grandchildren, and family all give testimony of the marvelous ministry to family that was given and taught.

While growing up my brothers and I knew that our parents loved us, and we knew that our parents were sold out and fully devoted to Christ. We never observed any inconsistency between talk and walk. They were the same whether they were at a church meeting or at home. Hazel and Lonnie taught Lon, Andrew, and me how to respect authority, how to do a day's work for a day's pay, how to serve others, how to learn from or endure criticism, and how to lead. Doing less than one's best was never tolerated. While high expectations were the norm, consolation and encouragement were given when one of us experienced loss or failure or injury. While they were strict with rules and discipline, our parents allowed for individual expression and encouraged each of us to be himself and to pursue his talents and interests. Lonnie and Hazel were aware of the unique pressures that are presented to a pastor's child, and they helped their sons to deal with them. While vacations were often cut short and not every ball game or performance was attended, the preacher and his wife found ways to make up for it. We were/are proud to be the sons of Lonnie and Hazel Shull. Our parents encouraged us to grow up, and, as we did, they transitioned the way they related to us. We

have benefitted immensely from their friendly guidance, and we greatly miss the counsel of the one we affectionately called, "Dear Ole Dad."

Music was a common enjoyment for everyone in the family. My mother made sure each son received training and opportunities to learn and love music. The Shull family has always enjoyed singing together, whether it was at church or in the car or in a performance or around the family piano. During the 1970's, we began singing together in church. Through the years we sang at funerals, family reunions, church services, and special concerts. Sometimes the wives and children would sing, too. In general, we spent more time performing than rehearsing, a formula that resulted in more enjoyment than excellence.
